In this project, students will take a stand in support of a public policy issue that matters to them. They will learn about all sides of several topics like education and the environment. Through respectful discourse, they will construct and articulate well-researched positions on a topic of their choice with an inspirational podcast!
Imagine if all our students could make their voices heard and become the changemakers our world needs. What a way to make a difference in the world!

 Start with why

Lesson 1: Agree to Disagree

Students learn to tolerate different views by exploring phenomena where people with different perspectives can see or hear the world in very different ways. **SCIENCE SOCIAL STUDIES SOCIAL EMOTIONAL LEARNING**

Lesson 2: Flex Your Thinking

Help students understand that a smart mind is willing to change when given good reason. Present students with information on both sides of an issue, and watch as they learn to think more flexibly.

Lesson 3: Introduce Issues and Create Debate

Guide students as they explore several public policy issues. Present them with both sides of hot topics in the news, and help them understand that there's more than one way to view the world.

Lesson 4: Debate the Issues

Once students understand the value of tolerance, help them take a respectful stand for their beliefs through constructive debate. **ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS**

Lesson 5: Plan Your Podcast

Help students prepare to produce a podcast by listening to several outstanding examples. Use what they have learned to create a script for an inspirational podcast of their own.

Use technology to amplify your students' voices by having them record and listen to their podcasts.

Get techy as your students polish their podcasts by making audio edits, adding music, and creating a powerful piece of work. **MATH**
